Diana **Cheesecake Bars** 

Graham Cracker Crumbs: 1.5 cups Brown Sugar (for crust): 1/4 cup Butter (melted, for crust): 6 tablespoons Cinnamon (for crust): 1 teaspoon Cheesecake Filling: packages) Sour Cream (room temperature): 1/2 cup Sugar: 2/3 cup Eggs (large, room temperature): 2 Vanilla Extract: 1 tablespoon Cinnamon Swirl: Butter (melted): 6 tablespoons Dark Brown Sugar: 1 cup Cinnamon: 1 teaspoon Flour: 1/4 cup

Preheat your oven to 350°F. Blend melted butter, graham crackers, brown sugar, and cinnamon until it resembles wet sand. Press this mixture into an  $8 \times 8''$  baking dish and bake for 8 minutes. Let it cool afterward. Lower the oven temperature to 325°F. In a blender, mix the cream cheese, sugar, and vanilla until smooth. Incorporate the sour cream and continue blend-

PearmanBlender Cinnamon Roll ing. Then, add eggs one at a time, ensuring smoothness. Over the crust, pour half of the filling. Dot it with cinnamon swirl, and carefully create swirl patterns using a knife. Repeat this step with the remaining filling. Bake at 325°F for 35-40 minutes or until the center is set but slightly jiggly. Refrigerate for two hours to firm up. For the cinnamon swirl, mix flour, brown Cream Cheese (softened): 16 ounces (two 8oz sugar, cinnamon, and melted butter until smooth.


